New energy service to begin in September

tarting in September, households and businesses in incorporated Walnut Creek will be automatically enrolled in MCE for their electric energy unless they choose to opt out and remain with PG&E.

After the switch to MCE in September, customers can still opt out at no cost within the first 60 days of service. After 60 days of service, there is a one-time fee of \$5 for residents and a one-time fee of \$25 for commercial customers to opt out.

From a customer experience, little will change. PG&E will continue to handle billing, deliver electricity, maintain the wires and provide gas service. MCE customers will see two fees on their bills, one for PG&E electric delivery, and one for MCE electric generation. The MCE electric generation fee simply replaces the PG&E electric generation fee.


The difference is that by default MCE provides 50 percent of its electricity from renewable energy sources such as solar, wind and hydroelectricity.





Get ready to help your neighbors in disaster

Be trained to make a difference in a disaster! Registration is under way for Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) basic training. CERT teaches everyday people how to safely and effectively respond to the needs of the community during emergencies. Graduates become volunteer Disaster Service Workers for the City. In event of emergency, CERTs gather at pre-set staging areas to help the neighborhoods.

Walnut Creek CERTs have also assisted police and public works officials with everything from searching for missing people to clearing out storm drains during heavy rains to prevent flooding.

The Fall 2016 CERT training will be held Tuesday evenings, Sept. 6 – Oct. 11, at the downtown library, with a final drill the morning of Saturday, Oct. 22. There is a \$25 fee. Call 925-256-3556 or visit www.walnut-creek.org/cert.
