


Walnut Creek City Council adopts new Housing Element

In January, the Walnut Creek City Council adopted the 2023-2031 Housing Element, which identifies potential sites for new housing development, as well as programs and actions for the City to take to foster more affordable housing and decrease homelessness. It is required by State law, and has been submitted to the State for review and certification.

As Walnut Creek has evolved from a small farming town to a post-WWII suburb and, more recently to a modern urbanizing community, the City has consistently focused on offering a multitude of housing choices to meet the needs of families of diverse income levels and sizes. Unlike most communities of our size, Walnut Creek's housing stock is primarily multifamily. Traditional single-family detached homes comprise only slightly more than a third of the housing stock, while more than 60 percent encompasses large apartment/condominium developments, duplexes, townhomes, and garden apartments that offer a wide range of affordability.

Over the last decade, the City has rezoned land primarily in the downtown area to increase housing affordability and housing mobility, decrease the need for a vehicle, and increase access to jobs, good schools, and a plethora of amenities. Coupled with the City's inclusionary housing ordinance and commercial linkage fees, the goal is to rebalance the costs of constructing housing to increase the number of affordable units available in the community. The city is also finalizing plans for permit-ready accessory dwelling units (ADUs) to reduce both barriers and costs related to building those units. New Year's Eve brought torrential rain to Walnut Creek and throughout northern California, resulting in 20 inches of rainfall over a period of several weeks. City Public Works crews spent much of December preparing for winter storms, cleaning out more than 6,000 inlets, trash capture devices and racks, and clearing gutters, and adding additional street sweeping. That prep work paid off when the heavy rains hit, as damage was mostly limited to downed trees, localized flooding, slides in Open Space and on trails, and several road failures. City facilities and properties incurred more than \$1 million in damages; the City recognizes many homeowners also sustained property damage. Timber is Walnut Creek's newest four-legged officer. Timber is a four-year-old Belgian Malinois from Holland. Before coming to the U.S., Timber placed 11th at the 2022 KNPV Nationals, a skills competition for service dogs. WCPD uses highly trained and skilled dogs to help de-escalate situations, locate missing people, find evidence of crimes and support the Central County SWAT team. 

BUSY STREETS IN DOWNTOWN WALNUT CREEK

Walnut Creek's downtown is host to amazing experiences, shopping, dining and more. With all the attractions comes plenty of people walking and driving.

Some streets within the downtown are larger and provide two lanes in each direction for vehicles: think California, Civic, Broadway and Mt. Diablo. These streets allow more vehicle traffic to flow through, but there are plenty of pedestrians, too—people who walk from their homes, between different destinations, or even from their parked cars. With wider streets, some drivers feel more comfortable driving at a faster speed. This is where it is critically important for you, as a driver, to watch your speed, watch for pedestrians crossing the street and watch for other vehicles stopped at a crosswalk.

The "multiple-threat pedestrian crash" occurs when a motorist in one lane stops for a pedestrian while motorists in the other lanes may or may not. As illustrated, if Car A stops for a pedestrian, Car A obscures both the pedestrian's view of approaching Car B, and Car B's view of the pedestrian. Remember, once you're out of your car, you're a pedestrian too.



Please be courteous and cautious when approaching a crosswalk, yield to pedestrians and watch your speed. As always, remember to "Go with the Slow."

Flood updates for residents

Residents of Walnut Creek and throughout the County are now able to seek assistance directly from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) if their property or business sustained damage during the winter storm surge. People with insurance should first file a claim with their insurance company, but additional resources may be available from FEMA. Apply online at DisasterAssistance.gov, or call 1-800-621-3362. Applying doesn't guarantee aid, but does connect residents to resources and information on available programs.

Do you know your property's status in terms of flood risk? It's easy to see if your property is in a Special Flood Hazard Area designated on FEMA's flood insurance rate map. FOOD DONATION FIGHTS HUNGER AND COMBATS CLIMATE CHANGE



EARLY 1 OUT OF EVERY 6 CONTRA COSTA residents is food insecure, meaning individuals or families struggle to find their next meal. Local food recovery organizations and community members have dedicated time and resources to changing this, and California has made food donation a requirement. The State passed Senate Bill 1383 with a goal of drastically reducing methane emissions from organics discarded in landfills. Residents now must separate organics from landfill waste, including food scraps, food soiled paper, and yard trimmings. Those should be composted in your green Recycle Smart bin.

Also important is the requirement that some businesses donate excess edible food to help feed community members in need. Mandated food donors have been placed in two tiers to ease-in the regulation.

The City of Walnut Creek already has resources in place to meet the new state mandates, and provide assistance for convenient and safe food donation. Recycle Smart, which manages the City's trash, recycling and organics services, partnered with White Pony Express, a local food recovery organization, to obtain a grant to increase food donation in Contra Costa County. White Pony Express offers free, as-needed food rescue services, and can pick up and distribute fresh and prepared foods within 24 hours. This helps our highest-need neighbors: isolated seniors, students and their families, veterans, and the unhoused. Walnut Creek residents can even volunteer with White Pony Express as a "food runner" to help get food to those in need.

Tier 2 January 1, 2024

Tier two businesses typically have more prepared foods to donate, which often require more careful handling to meet food safety requirements (e.g. time and temperature controls).

CITY HOSTS OFFICE FORUM EVENT

HE CITY OF WALNUT CREEK'S ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DIVISION held the City's first "Office Forum" to introduce the recently completed office and medical office market studies. The event, held in December at the Walnut Creek Executive Park in Shadelands, drew more than 40 commercial property owners, brokers and key stakeholders. They heard insightful presentations on Walnut Creek's current office and medical office markets, and engaged in meaningful dialogue from a range of perspectives. Special thanks to the venue host and networking reception sponsors, California Capital and Investment Group and the Walnut Creek Chamber of Commerce.

With the fluidity of industry conditions and changes brought about by COVID, the City's Economic Development Division commissioned regional expert consultants to conduct analyses of three key market segments in Walnut Creek: downtown retail space, citywide office space, and medical office demand. The latter was prompted by the opening of two new cancer centers in Walnut Creek.

All three market studies and the executive summary are now available and posted on the City's Economic Development website at walnutcreekconnected.com.

Overall, the good news is that Walnut Creek fared well generally in those market segments. The downtown retail market is very strong, and has many opportunities ahead. Similarly, the new John Muir Health and BASS Cancer are anticipated to bring new demand for medical office buildings. In line with both national and regional trends and the increase in work-fromhome arrangements, general office needs are the most challenged of the market segments. This is not unique to Walnut Creek, and the City appears to be in the middle of the trends on vacancy and lease rates.

These studies are intended to be a baseline that will spur discussion, and in the coming months the City's Economic Development team will continue meeting with stakeholders and partners to explore ideas and options that will be used to develop an Economic Development Action Plan for the next two years. Special emphasis will be placed on ways to support office properties and attract new jobs and companies to Walnut Creek. Additionally, another study looking at the levels of viable retail options citywide will be published online this spring.

Outdoor dining to continue in Walnut Creek



In January, the Walnut Creek City Council adopted an updated Outdoor Dining Policy. It will allow for a comprehensive outdoor dining program, and made some elements of outdoor dining, which were previously temporary, into permanent amenities. An ordinance on design standards and operational requirements for outdoor dining spaces and a fee structure were approved at the January 17, 2023, City Council meeting.

The continuation of the outdoor dining program will result in structures that add to the attractive appeal of downtown Walnut Creek and are operated in a responsible manner.

KNOW YOUR WALNUT CREEK PARKS:

HOWE HOMESTEAD PARK



JUST A SHORT WALK FROM downtown is Howe Homestead Park, the former home of Associated Press correspondent James Howe. Crossing over the old stone bridge from the Howe Homestead parking lot, one gets an impression of the area as it appeared in the late 1930's. Howe Homestead serves as the western access to Shell Ridge open space. Hikers can start on the Kovar Trail and walk to the crest of Mount Diablo 10 miles away.

James Howe was a noted Associated Press correspondent from the early 20th century. Howe was stationed in many of the world's Great Cities—London, Paris, Warsaw, Berlin, Brussels, Moscow, Tokyo, Peking, Shanghai, Bombay, Washington, Honolulu, and San Francisco. For three decades, Howe circled the globe covering world-sharing events such as World War I, the Russo-Polish war, the Sino-Japanese war, the Chinese Revolution. Howe interviewed influential and historic figures including Gandhi, Lindbergh, George Bernard Shaw, King George, Lloyd George. When he retired in 1935, he chose to move to Walnut Creek. He remodeled the home at the Howe Homestead and built it into his treasured estate that is now shared with the public today.

In addition to the natural beauty that abounds, a beloved feature of the park is the Community Gardens. There are 48 gardening plots rented to residents of Walnut Creek for growing vegetables and ornamental plants. The Community Gardens are very popular with a multiyear waiting list.

We invite you to visit this local treasure, located at 2950 Walnut Blvd. Howe Homestead is open from dawn to dusk, 7 days a week. A small picnic area is available on a first come, first serve basis and a restroom is located in the central part of the park.
