YOUR MEASURE O TAX DOLLARS AT WORK

EVERAL MAJOR PROJECTS ARE in progress in Walnut Creek with funding primarily from the voterapproved Measure O. The largest project is the planned replacement of the aquatic center and community center at Heather Farm Park, which is still in the design phase. Other efforts underway include converting two ballfields at Heather Farm Park into synthetic turf fields, allowing fewer rainy-day closures for planned play, and the fields will allow for safe and sustainable conditions year-round. The City has also been able to expand its crossing



guard program to ensure safe walks and rides to schools, and expanded hours at our two libraries are also benefitting from the sales tax dollars

Arts are an essential part of the quality of life in Walnut Creek, and Measure O funding is also making an impact at the Lesher Center for the Arts. The revenue supports production and marketing staff recommended in the Center's strategic plan, which has expanded the operating model to proactively book artists to perform on City stages and for staff to absorb new responsibilities as a presenting sponsor. The City expects to receive significant return on the investment in this new operating model through increased attendance for the Lesher Center and downtown restaurants, and sponsorships and donations from individuals.

Election season underway

The primary election will take place on March 5, and now there is another option for dropping off your ballot in a secure location. For several years, there has been a ballot drop off box next to the City Hall parking


lot. The volume of ballots being returned there has steadily grown, so the County Registrar of Voters office has installed a second, larger one next to the

entry doors at City Hall on N. Main Street. The larger ballot box can hold up to 1,300 ballots. Both boxes are emptied by elections staff almost every day. Ballots can be dropped off through 7:00 p.m. on March 5. During the November election, the City of Walnut Creek will have three city council positions on the ballot.

Driving range improvements coming to Boundary Oak Golf Course

The City of Walnut Creek is proud to have Boundary Oak Golf Course as one of its most beautiful and entertaining facilities, serving as one of the best municipal golf courses in Northern California. Boundary Oak's driving range, though, is due for modernization. The range will undergo a comprehensive upgrade this summer to address aging infrastructure and a deteriorating landscape. The City Council authorized the improvement project in January, which will create a more modern, environmentally sustainable driving range with contemporary amenities and an improved appearance. The improved driving range experience, paired with the 18-hole championship course, Taphouse Bar and Grill, and a beautiful event venue with complete rental services and amenities, will excite regular patrons and entice many new users. The driving range improvements are expected to be complete this fall.

Con Fire enhancing wildfire protection in Rossmoor



Groundbreaking has taken place for a shaded fuel break across Walnut Creek and southern Lafayette that will provide significant protection from wildfires for Rossmoor residents. A shaded fuel break is a strip of land where wildfire "fuel," (such as dead trees and brush, dead branches and needles, or downed logs,) has been removed to limit a fire's potential rapid spread. The Contra Costa County Fire Protection District (Con Fire) received a \$3 million grant from the State.

The project area will encompass roughly 200 acres along eleven miles of East Bay open space, with the goal to considerably reduce the threat by decreasing the fuels critical to the spread of a wildfire. Fuel breaks go a long way towards lowering the intensity and speed of a wildfire, allowing more time for firefighters to respond, especially in hard to reach locations.

REDUCE YOUR FLOOD RISK

THILE THIS EL NINO YEAR IS LOOKING TO BE MILDER compared to last year in terms of catastrophic rain events, a flood does not have to be a catastrophic event to result in high out-of-pocket costs, and you do not have to live in a high-risk flood area to suffer flood damage. In fact, from 2014 to 2018, policyholders outside of high-risk flood areas filed more than 40% of all National Flood Insurance Program claims, and required one-third of federal disaster assistance for flooding.


PROPERTY OWNERS SHOULD REMEMBER TO:

Buy Flood Insurance

Most standard homeowner policies do not cover flood damage. Flood insurance protects your investment and provides peace of mind. Talk to your insurance agent about the National Flood Insurance Program's low-cost options.

Prepare Now

Gather supplies in case of a storm, strengthen your home against damage, and review your insurance coverages. No flood insurance? It typically takes 30 days for a new flood insurance policy to go into effect, so waiting until the next storm is approaching would be too late. The City's five sandbag locations are stocked and ready; if your property is prone to flooding,



getting them in advance makes sense.

Plan Ahead

Know how you would get out safely if flooding occurred on your property. Keep important papers in a safe, waterproof place. Conduct a home inventory: itemize and take pictures of possessions,

and the inside and outside of your home.

SUSTAINABILITY UPDATE

The Sustainability Action Plan, adopted in July 2023, serves as a guide for the City of Walnut Creek to achieve a sustainable future, adapt to changing climate conditions, and rapidly reduce greenhouse gas emissions for a net-zero emissions goal by 2045. The plan consists of more than 125 actions the City will implement to achieve our sustainability goals. Implementation is outlined in three timeframes: near-term (by year-end 2023), mid-term (by year-end 2026), and long term (by year-end 2030).

The City made significant progress on the near-term actions in the areas of diverting waste from

landfills, reducing the impacts of poor air quality, and establishing local resilience hubs. Notable achievements include: promoting the RE:Source tool for community reuse or repurpose options, improving Spare the Air messaging, and continuing to promote resources for emergency preparedness. Staff members continue to work toward implementing the mid-term and long-term actions while maintaining progress on the short-term actions. 

Search and Rescue Team recruiting members

The Contra Costa Sheriff Search and Rescue Team (CoCoSAR) is currently seeking new members. Applications will be accepted through June for the September training Academy.

CoCoSAR is a 200-member all-volunteer group. Its primary focus is to find missing persons quickly and safely in urban or wilderness locations and reunite them with their loved ones. Search and rescue teams also provide support in times of need, disaster or other emergency. The work can be physically, mentally, and emotionally challenging, but also comes with great rewards.

Members don't need any special skills or experience to join the team. They are looking for people with the right attitude and a genuine desire to help others. Members are provided extensive training in all the skills that might be needed to become a qualified searcher and first responder. Team members come from many different backgrounds and professions, and many find ways to leverage their existing skills as search and rescue team members.

Free Income Tax preparation services

Tax season is here, and for many people, this can be a challenging time. Free income tax preparation for the 2023 tax season is available now through the AARP Foundation's Tax-Aide program. It provides IRS certified tax counselors for residents at various locations throughout Contra Costa County. In Walnut Creek, the tax assistance is being offered in the Vista Room of the Hillside Clubhouse in Rossmoor, and appointments should be made onsite.

Other nearby locations where the services will be available include Pleasant Hill Hillcrest Congregational Church, the Concord Senior Center, the Concord Library, and the Lafayette Library. Several other locations are available throughout Contra Costa County, but not as close to Walnut Creek. For general information or specifics about how to book an appointment outside of Rossmoor, call 925-726-3199.

The service is offered to people of all ages with limited to moderate income, and with special attention given to those age 50 or older. Since 1986, the program has helped more than 78 million taxpayers.



Mountain Shadow Film Society in 11th Season

Mountain Shadow Film Society brings the best in international and independent filmmaking to Walnut Creek. Monthly shows are held in the Walnut Creek downtown public library. These films follow international film festivals, and are pre-theatrical or new theatrical releases. otherwise unavailable in our community. Walnut Creek's office market was the sector hardest hit by the COVID pandemic. Corporate downsizing and the uncertainty of work-from-home and hybrid work trends have led to a significant increase in vacancy rates locally and nationwide. However, while Walnut Creek also saw a drop in occupancy, it was much smaller, and new companies continue to locate in Walnut Creek.

A recent report released by real estate firm Jones Lang LaSalle (JLL) suggests that 2024 could mark a nationwide turning point in the return of employees to the office citing data from employee security badge swipes. Based on that data, in-office attendance is expected to keep rising through the rest of the year as a wave of companies begin to shift in favor of a return to office, with some offices back in person 100% and others doing a hybrid schedule.

Walnut Creek is seeing a

rebound in its office and medical office markets with new companies moving in, specifically to newer and/or remodeled office spaces. In fact, downtown office buildings have the highest occupancy rates in the North 680 corridor. Recent activity in the downtown area includes:


- The law firm of Gordon, Rees, Skully & Mansukhani has relocated from Oakland to Pringle Ave.
- Retail brokerage firm The Econic Group will be opening its East Bay office at The Plaza on N. California Blvd.
- Commercial brokerage firm JLL has expanded its office square footage within The Plaza.
- Flagstar Bank will be establishing its back-office operations and staff at Ygnacio Center on N. Main St.
- Lincoln Financial Group has leased 5,000 square feet on

Mt Diablo Blvd.

• Kindbody Fertility practice will open later this month on N. Main St.

In the Shadelands district, Collab Fertility, a one-of-akind, state-of-the art fertility center, recently opened on Ygnacio Valley Rd. The 8,000 square foot facility, with a fertility clinic and an in vitro fertilization (IVF) lab features three large viewing windows into the embryology lab, one of the largest labs in the Bay Area. Additionally, Muir Pulmonary leased 7,000 square feet in the same building.

With its prime location within the Bay Area and safety as a high priority, Walnut Creek continues to be a strong draw for financial, insurance, real estate, design, and legal businesses, and is poised to continue grow its medical and healthcare ecosystem.






CONSTRUCTION WORK CONTINUES ON LOCUST STREET







East Bay Municipal Utility District has completed its work replacing and installing 2,500 feet of water main piping originally put in place in the 1950s. The new water main will improve reliability, reduce the likelihood of water main breaks, and increase water flow to the downtown area.

Now underway is work by the Contra Costa County Central Sanitation District to replace the sewer lines in the same area of Locust Street, as well as on several side streets. The sewer replacement work is roughly one-third complete, with the goal of finishing in May of this year. Following the sewer work, Walnut Creek Public Works Department will begin the process of repaving and sealing the roadways that have been under construction. The City appreciates the patience of businesses, shoppers, diners and visitors that have been impacted by the more than a yearlong project.



City staffing and service levels up

From police officers to park maintenance crews, City workers are essential and allow residents to enjoy the Walnut Creek lifestyle. Like most employers, the City was challenged post-pandemic to fill vacant jobs. The City worked with Regional Government Services, a public agency, to assist with recruitment efforts which resulted in filling 88 fully-benefitted positions with qualified employees in 2023 alone. This brought the City's vacancy rate down significantly.

County Connection fares have been reduced


Whether you use County Connection's bus service for your commute, to get to school, or to hop on the free downtown trolley, County Connection is a major part of our community's transit system. Beginning at the first of the year, County Connection lowered rates for a number of services.

Youth Clipper discounts have gone from 20% off to 50% off for youth ages 6 – 18 on any County Connection route. Clipper START users have also gone to a 50% off rate for eligible riders. And the County Connection Express routes now cost \$2.00, the same as local routes, for anyone who pays with a regular adult Clipper card. CELEBRATING 50 YEARS OF EXPANDED OPEN SPACE



1S A LANDMARK ANNIVERSARY YEAR FOR the City of Walnut Creek and its residents who appreciate and enjoy the nearly 3,000 acres of Open Space. Those acres are spread in four unique areas and offer more than seven miles of neighborhood trails. It was 50 years ago that Walnut Creek residents passed a bond to allow for the purchase of most of the City's Open Space.

The R-8 Bond enabled the purchase of Lime Ridge, Shell Ridge, Sugarloaf and Acalanes, as well as a couple of local community parks.

To honor the anniversary of this major investment half a century ago, the City's Public Works Department, in collaboration with the Walnut Creek Open Space Foundation and the Walnut Creek Historical Society, will be hosting several celebratory events throughout the year.

On June 6, the Historical Society will host an event at Shadelands Ranch Museum. The Museum will showcase a visual timeline of events and milestones crucial to the success of the Open Space Foundation's mission and the preservation of the City of Walnut Creek's natural environment. It will also pay tribute to the community participation and grassroots activism that enabled the purchase of so much acreage.

On June 8, the City will host a Heritage



Day celebration at Borges Ranch, with food trucks and activities for the whole family. In the fall, there will be a community planting of 50 trees in various parts of the Open Space to honor the anniversary. More details will be available closer to the events.
