After-Hours Work Permits

Regulations

Section 4-6.203 (f) of the Municipal Code restricts the time work may be conducted on construction projects to the hours of 7:00AM to 6:00PM weekdays, which are not City holidays.

<u>Work Requiring a Permit.</u> Note that this restriction only applies to work that requires a permit. That is, projects that do not require a permit to build are not regulated by these provisions. Please refer to the Building Division Web Site at <u>http://www.walnut-creek.org/building</u> for a list of projects that do not require a permit by specific Municipal Code or by City Policy.

<u>Discretionary Review.</u> The Chief of Code Enforcement (Chief Building Official) may grant permission for work to be done during other times for good cause, based upon the following criteria:

- 1) If the public health, safety and welfare will not be impaired, and
- 2) That loss or inconvenience would result to any person in interest by not allowing the work to be undertaken during times other than that specified in the Municipal Code.

<u>Emergency Work.</u> In case of urgent necessity in the interest of public health and safety, the Chief of Code Enforcement may issue a permit to conduct emergency work for a period not to exceed three days or less while the emergency continues.

Fees

An administrative fee applies to each After-Hours Work Permit in accordance with City of Walnut Creek's Fees and Charges.

Guidelines

After-hours permits issued under non-emergency conditions become void immediately upon the city receiving noise-related complaints of the construction activity – this is specifically stated on the permit. Where after-hour permits are issued for weekend work, work hours are generally limited to 9:00AM to 5:00PM on Saturdays and 10:00AM to 4:00PM on Sundays. An after-hours permit is generally not issued for a project for which the city has already received a noise-related complaint of work outside the normal work hours. Projects are evaluated on a case-by-case basis. However, the following guidelines currently apply:

<u>Residential Projects.</u> After-hours permits are generally not issued for projects within residential areas. An exception has been given to single-family and duplex residential permits that are owner-builder and that are not hiring any contractors to perform any portion of the construction. These after-hour permits have specific conditions that must be followed.

<u>Commercial Projects.</u> Commercial projects are evaluated based upon the proximity of the work relative to residential neighborhoods and the nature of the work to be conducted. Generally, commercial projects within a block of residential neighborhoods are not issued after-hours work permits due to the likelihood of residential neighbors being affected by noise.

<u>Emergency Work.</u> Examples of emergency situations include, but are not limited to, re-roofing projects where inclement weather is anticipated and electrical or plumbing work required due to failure of electrical mains or fuel-gas piping leaks.
