Robust voter turnout boosts schools, Measure I

Talnut Creek voters turned out in a big way to support schools and Broadway Plaza's bid to bring Neiman Marcus to Walnut Creek.

An impressive 55 percent of registered Walnut Creek voters participated in the Nov. 3 special election. By comparison, only 21 percent of registered San Ramon voters cast ballots in that city's mayoral race; countywide, the turnout was 39 percent.

Rossmoor voter participation was particularly strong, with nearly 73 percent voting.

Measure I, which asked voters to approve construction of a two-story anchor retail store such as Neiman Marcus at the corner of Mt. Diablo Boulevard and Main Street, garnered 71.4 percent approval.

Parcel taxes for the Walnut Creek School District and Acalanes Union High School District sailed past the required two-thirds approval, with 75.73 percent and 74.50 percent support respectively.

New WCTV showcases community

alnut Creek residents can now enjoy even more original television programming focused on the local community, thanks to the launch of WCTV.

The City assumed responsibility for Walnut Creek's government access channel from Comcast on Oct. 29 and began producing programming under the name WCTV. Agreements with the cable companies serving Walnut Creek provide dedicated funds for these activities that cannot be used for any other purpose.

"Producing our government access channel gives us another way to engage the community. People can know what's going on in Walnut

Creek just by turning on their television," said City Manager Gary Pokorny.

"In these tough budget times, sharing information with the community is even more important, and these special funds exist to help us do just that."

In addition to continued live coverage of City Council and Planning Commission meetings, WCTV features City programs and coverage of special events, such as Civic Arts Education class productions, the Holiday Tree Lighting and Walnut Creek On Ice. Local weather and traffic updates are available at specific times throughout the day, and a "WCTV Guide" is available on the City website.

Upcoming programs include a look at the new Walnut Creek Library under construction, volunteer opportunities within the City, and Lesher Center for the Arts events, as well as "How To" segments on everything from taking out a building permit to properly pruning trees.

WCTV is not available to Comcast viewers in unincorporated Walnut Creek, nor in Rossmoor, as these areas have separate franchise agreements. However, streaming video of City Council and Planning Commission meetings is available on the City's website, www.walnut-creek.org. In addition, the City is partnering with Rossmoor to deliver prerecorded coverage of City Council meetings and select special programs.

New mayor chosen

The City Council on Dec. 3 selected Sue Rainey to serve as mayor for the next year.

Rainey first joined the City Council in 1997 when she was appointed to complete the term of Ron Beagley after his death. She was elected to a four-year term in 1998 and has been on the Council since then. This is her third term as mayor.

Councilwoman Cindy Silva was named mayor pro tem. Silva won election to the City Council in 2006, and previously served on the Planning Commission.

Everyone who lives or works in Walnut Creek, including unincorporated Walnut Creek, is welcome to be part of this community program.



Sign up for 2010 CERT team training


2009 was a banner year for Walnut Creek's Community Emergency
Response Team program. CERT volunteers held two drills based at Larkey Park, involving a combined total of more than 200 people who practiced searching homes, setting up a medical treatment area, and sending messages with radios between search teams and the City's Emergency Operations Center.

CERT graduates are sworn in as Disaster Service Workers for the City, and are able to make a difference while staying safe in the critical hours following a major disaster.

'Green' ground squirrel control

Birders and other fans of "Watchable Wildlife" sites have noticed the installation of new raptor perches at two Open Space areas. The first phase of the project included 12

perches on North Lime Ridge along the Ygnacio Canal Trail and the pastures around Borges Ranch in Shell Ridge.

The perches were

installed by the county
Department of Agriculture
through a Fish and
Wildlife Committee grant
as a safer alternative to using bait to
reduce over-population of ground
squirrels and other pest species in the
area. In the near future, the bait that many
people use to control squirrel populations
will be labeled as a "caution" pesticide
and will be restricted in its distribution.

An added benefit for the Open Space visitors is these areas will become even better habitat and more accessible wildlife observation areas.

Ygnacio Valley goes green

Thanks to a partnership between PG&E and the City, 126 streetlights along Ygnacio Valley Road have been replaced with light-emitting diodes (LEDs). As a result, lighting levels are improved, but energy use is down, saving the City nearly \$10,000 a year.

Dedicated citizens bring history to park

Visitors to Larkey Park can now know its history, thanks to the efforts of private citizens Nick and Robin Cimino and Dr. and Mrs. Richard Larkey, who paid for a storyboard panel to be installed at the park. The four worked in partnership with

the Walnut Creek Historical Society and City staff for some 18 months before celebrating the installation on Nov. 11.

Dr. Larkey is the great-grandson of John Larkey, who settled in the area in 1857. Part of his 830-acre ranch became Larkey Park.

New eLockers offer secure bicycle storage

Re-Cycling

Need a secure, dry place to store your bicycle downtown? Check out the eLockers in front of City Hall, 1666 N. Main Street.

Four electronically controlled bicycle lockers were installed Nov. 10. Each locker has an electronic BikeLink card reader; a user swipes the BikeLink card in the

reader to open the locker. Once the locker is shut, it will only unlock with the same card used when the bike was parked. The hourly use fee is automatically deducted from the card; in Walnut Creek, the hourly fee is 5 cents.

BikeLink cards are purchased online at **www.bikelink.org.**

The eLockers at City Hall are part of Walnut Creek's effort to support alternative modes of transportation. They are made possible through a partnership with 511 Contra Costa, the local commute alternatives program, and funded by the Contra Costa Transportation Authority's half-cent sales tax for transportation improvement projects and the Bay Area Air Quality Management District.

Because eLockers offer secure storage, they have proven popular, according to 511 Contra Costa. Each eLocker serves seven times the users as conventional

bike lockers.

While the eLockers at City Hall are the first to be installed by a Central Contra Costa city, they are part of a growing BikeLink system that extends

from Seattle to Los Angeles.

microchip to track parking time and any validations. Take the token with you after parking your car and ask participating stores and restaurants to validate it using a handheld validation unit.

When you return to the parking garage, drop the token in a pay station and pay the parking fee. Then use the token to open the exit gate.


You can skip the token altogether by using a credit card when you enter and exit the garage. There is no validation with this payment method.


Since the system will be fully automated, the garages will be open 24 hours a day.

The new system will significantly reduce the City's operating costs, saving more than \$1 million over the next 10 years.

And, by replacing paper parking tickets and validation stamps with reusable tokens, the new system is eco-friendly.

Installation will begin at the City parking garage on Broadway in February, and will be done one garage at a time over a period of 3-4 months. The other City garages are next to the Lesher Center for the Arts and above the Lark Creek Café, both on Locust Street.
